Have it tested....

Virginia is a “transition zone” for turf grass, meaning there is no perfect grass for our cold winters and hot, dry summers.

While Tall Fescue, a cool season grass, is the most common in the area, it may need more water in the summer. Warm season grasses, like zoysia, Bermuda and St. Augustine, are slower to green-up in the Spring but will tolerate the summer. A mix of cool and warm season grasses may be the best choice year round.

However, before you decide to fertilize your lawn, you should have your soil tested. Not all grasses are fertilized at the same time of year. A soil test will tell you how much, if any, fertilizer is needed to maintain your grass. You can pick up test kits at local garden stores, or a local [Virginia Cooperative Extension office](#).
